The 28th Art Show continued the theme and success of previous shows with 350 works on show by 100 Artists and over 700 visitors enjoying the opening and viewing weekend. It was another big year both in terms of effort and result, we estimate the show takes 600-700 hours of work over 12 months, all of that provided by our organising committee and Hobart Rotary Club Volunteers and friends. This year, fifty five major works were sold and our auction results saw all 13 items purchased.

The Show's aims are to raise public awareness of Rotary, provide fellowship and community engagement, give artists the opportunity to be exposed to the public and sell their works, and to raise funds for Rotary's charitable work. It is one of our major fund raisers helping to support Rotary causes that our club assist and this year our surplus was around \$13000.

Highlights from the 2017/2018 year include:

- 2. arranging three youth exchanges for 2018/2019 for Benjamin Ogenrwot from Uganda, Embla Sundkvist from Sweden and Ingrid Rasmussen from Denmark
- 3. hosting Soren Boe Rasmussen, Dennis Calendar, Tina Jesperson and Peter Lykov Clauson who were part of the Danish Professional Exchange from 13-16 June 2018, providing them with valuable opportunities, including a visit to Bill Casimaty's business, presenting at our Club lunch on 14 June 2018, and attending a meet-and-greet event at the basement of Club Cook;
- 4. hosting an End Polio Now event during our lunch on 9 November 2017, providing an update on the history of the project, the current statistics and what is left to do to achieve a world without polio;
- 5. assisting in the preparations for the Australian New Zealand Rotary Conference held in the 2018/2019 Rotary year;
- 6. our members Una Hobday and Kate Domeney coordinating a very successful Food Plant Solutions event 'Fresh Food for Families' for the Nepalese community; and

7. a number of our members receiving Paul Harris Fellows for their personal contributions to Rotary International and the Rotary Foundation.

As always, our Club's participation in the International arm of Rotary is not only sourced from Club activities and committees, but also due to a large number of our members actively participating and encouraging participation in District and International events.

As a result, our Club made the following donations made to International causes:

'Charity House' Project—Help Unleash Greatness (HUG House)

The Rotary Club of Hobart HUG House started as an idea—to build a new house on a large rural-type lot, sell the house and land package, and raise funds for the Rotary Club of Hobart. The Club would then devote the funds to longer-term community projects. And so the HUG House project began.

Rotarian Renzo D'Orazio and his family were developing Braeview Estate—a rural property in Old Beach, a suburb 25 minutes north of Hobart. Lots within the Estate were all one- hectare blocks with views to Mt Wellington and northerly aspects. The D'Orazio family selected Lot 10, to donate to the R C Hobart for the HUG House Project.

Wilson Homes joined the project to manage construction of the House, and building began in June 2017. Through Wilson Homes, around \$200,000 in materials, services and supplies were donated to build the 241-square metre, four-bedroom home. Much of the work on the building was donated or provided at cost. Renzo and his wife, Trina, worked with Wilson Homes to oversee the project together.

Construction was completed at the end of May 2018. Landscaping of the grounds and gardens started after this. Clennett's Mitre 10 Kingston was extremely generous in arranging supplies of plants, mulch, loam, and other landscaping materials. Rotarian Bill Casimaty (PHF) donated turf for the garden through his business, StrathAyr Instant Lawn. Renzo spent many hours in his grader and excavator finishing off the site, and putting in the driveway to the home to complete the works. Rotarians gathered on the weekend before the Grand Opening to plant, lay turf, and get the grounds ready for sale of the home.

The House was opened on Sunday 17 June. Patrick Noisier from Harcourts Signature was appointed as agent for the sale. Over 110 people attended the Grand Opening, with members of RC Hobart putting on a free sausage sizzle.

A great deal of interest has been expressed for the House. Offers to purchase the House have been presented to the Board. From the sale, the Rotary Club of Hobart will receive around \$500,000 net profit.

The RCH Board has agreed that the first recipient of some funds from the sale of the HUG House will be the West Moonah Community House (WMCH). The WMCH is seeking assistance to provide an extension to their Men's Shed facility, which will increase the workspace area, and improve the amenity for Men's Shed members.

Longer term, the Board has adopted a strategy where the bulk of the funds will be directed to one or more community projects, and leave a long-lasting legacy of benefits to the Hobart and Tasmanian community.

But, what is the HUG House? The vision that the D'Orazio family had for the 'HUG' House was to bring a group of people—trades, suppliers, Rotarians, partners and friends of Rotarians, and various other helpers—to work on a project to help others. And in doing this, Help Unleash Greatness ... Unleash Greatness in each of those involved in the building, and Help Unleash Greatness in the community via a number of projects which will benefit from the profits received in the sale of the home. The project was one *giant HUG*, embracing all involved. It is a HUG the size of a House.
