## Presidential Report 2018 – 2019

Last year I made reference to David Walsh's impact on Tasmania being at the bleeding edge and pushing boundaries and community views.

I had a few jokes about a name change to RoHo, having night meetings- Dark RoHo and changing the name of the Brand Band to the RoHo MoFos along with doing a solstice nude swim at Changeover.

I went on to talk about the club remaining relevant to ensure a healthy future and suggested we should look at meeting format and things like Grace and the Anthem.

I also said that it is our club not mine and that tradition is important; without tradition life would be as precarious as that of the Fiddler on the Roof.

The club survey over the last two years show that most of you don't have a strong view on this either way. A small group are for or against with a small margin for leaving things how they are.

I encourage all members to consider this in the future through our club survey. To attract new members I think these changes for the club to remain relevant are important.

A wise member of the club tells me often that if ain't broke don't fix it. However, these things I think do need addressing.

I think things will change over time and I hope that members embrace change as it occurs for the long term benefit of this club and the work we do.

My second aim for the year was to get funding strategy in place to make best of the opportunity the Club has to make the most impact over most appropriate time frame given our strong balance sheet due a long history of successful fundraising and administration and the recent success – of the fantastic HUG House project. I will mention HUG House some more in this report.

Members made it clear they wanted to take time with this process so that we could achieve a strategy with strong member buy in. That you wanted to be appraised of a number of matters relation to fundraising, how we spend our money and what the Taroon Trust is all about.

To that end we have all benefited on presentations from Club members on all these aspects of our fundraising and Funding.

A background document has been prepared and there will be a forum were all members can have input to inform the Board as they determine our future funding strategy.

The third item I said I would focus on was public relations. We had some great media during the year including on Hug House, Sail Day, the Art Show and Robert Brand and Ben.

We established a relationship with a Communications Company where Mark Thomas provides pro bono PR support. The club survey indicated we could do more in telling our good news stories but I believe we have established an excellent base to build on.

#### The 29th Charity Art Show:

While constrained by a smaller venue in Wrest Point Hotel's Derwent Room, our show enjoyed success with 242 works on show by 75 Artists and 500 people visiting during the weekend. Over sixty guests attended Opening Night and spirited bidding for a range of art work, wine, accommodation and other items, gave the show a great start.

The show's two main aims are to give artists the opportunity to show and sell their works; and to raise funds for Rotary's charitable work. It is one of our major annual fund raisers helping to support Rotary's efforts to assist local, national and international community causes. We estimate the show takes 600-700 hours of work over 12 months by our organising committee and Hobart Rotary Club Volunteers and friends.

This year, eleven organisations sponsored the show categories and thirteen people and businesses provided auction and raffle items, giving us a solid financial underpinning for the show. Artist sales commission, entry fees, philanthropic donations and catalogue sales helped us achieve a show surplus around \$14000. An excellent result.

The show was opened by the Hon Elise Archer MP, Attorney-General, Minister for Justice, Minister for Corrections, Minister for the Arts, Minister for the Environment. Elise gave a knowledgeable talk on the show and its history and purpose and led the way with spirited and successful bidding at the auction!

After seeing the sun rise on the boats berthed at the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania, the final preparations were underway, for what was a perfect day for the 28th Rotary Club of Hobart Charity Sail Day. Forty six boats this year enjoyed the cruise down to the Channel and a great day was had on (and in) the water. Over \$33,000 was raised this year, including \$9,000 from the raffle, reflecting another great fundraising effort from the event first held back in 1992.

We were again well supported by the skippers who donated their services and boats for the day, and the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania who assisted with logistics and preparation for the event, and the crew of the Egeria who hosted the Committee and Board on the day. It was great to have the sailing vessel Rhona H out with us this year and Co-Op Toyota again sponsoring Sailability to participate. Carlton Park Surf Life Saving Club, Kingborough & Dodges Ferry Volunteer Marine Rescue and Tasmania Police again were a key part of the day on the water.

Once again we had fantastic support from our provisioning sponsors Tasmanian Bakeries, Cascade Breweries, Coca-Cola, Robert Oatley Wines and Salamanca Fresh, and with the promotional support from Southern Cross Austereo and the Mercury. ### **Magic Show**

Each year the key goal of the Magic Show is to provide an opportunity for some 2100 disadvantaged young and adult Tasmanians with the opportunity to participate as audience members watching a world class touring Magic show the "World Festival of Magic" which was held at the Hotel Grand Chancellor on the 2nd of December with 2 sittings. In addition, in a win-win for the Club, the portion of funds raised from the show, that are allocated to the Hobart Rotary Club, were reinvested into the local Tasmanian community through the funding Committee to support of programs such as Food Plant Solutions, Bethlehem House, Windward Bound, End Polio now and the Christchurch earthquake appeal.

In the 2018 Magic Show, nearly \$110,000 was raised in total of which the club received \$15,000, this was slightly under the budgeted \$17,500 for the year, with overall income being down slightly.

- **SEC (Science and Engineering Challenge)** Ian Shuey

Additionally, we had involvement with **MUNA and Rotaract**

Some of these programs run at a particular time of the year and are event specific, others run all year. Having an actively engaged Chair is important to maintain the energy and enthusiasm of a team and ensure objectives are met. On the whole, Chairs and team members have done well this year.

**Ian Shuey stepped up to Chair the SEC** as well as NYSF which are two of the busier roles. Christine Moane had to resign in February and Ian Shuey took on the SEC District Chair with responsibility for the SEC program across the state working with Susie Haley from UTAs. In Hobart our club provided people to help run the May UTAs week which again was a great success. An additional day was added this year to the Hobart event to cater for demand.

**NYSF** saw us sponsoring two students to the Jan 2019 sessions and we have 3 students seeking our support this year to attend 2020 NYSF having been successful in district selection. Students who have attended NYSF have reported back to our club and that certainly speak highly of the experience and impact it has had on their career outlooks. One of our students is returning in 2020 as a 'schoolie' to help run a 10 day session.

**Rotary Youth Driver Awareness.** Mark Roberts looks after RYDA, a school program supporting safe driving which runs daily over 3 weeks at the Show Grounds. There was good participation for the 2018 event and we are getting ready for the 2019 program starting in August.

**Rotary Youth Leadership Award.** We did not have much input to the event this year, held annually on the NW Coast, and Renzo D'Orazio has taken over as Chair for 2019-20 which should lift our club's involvement.

**Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment.** Mark Roberts organized our club's input for the Camp at Lea's Paddock in May 2019. It ran well after not being held in 2018 due to lack of numbers.

**Youth Exchange Program** Matthew Drake has been active in working on hosting our incoming students. A constant issue is lack of host families, something other clubs also seem to be having a problem with, and this year we will host only one student.

**Rotary Adventure in Citizenship (RAIC)** and **Civics for Citizenship (CCC)**

CCC is a school prize run by schools which our committee judges with a State Govt Minister presenting prizes, \$500/300/100. RAIC happens In May each year with around 35 Yr11 students visiting Canberra, sponsored by Clubs at a cost of about \$1200 each. This year our club sponsored two students to attend.

**Literacy**

This was initiated some years ago but has not had a specific focus this year. However, an offshoot was to support literacy in the prison system both for the in-mates and their children. This was done in conjunction with then Club member Rosie Martin. The Civics for Citizenship Essay Competition has been another offshoot.

**Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)**

Our club has Collegiate School as our responsibility to promote the opportunity to their Year 10 students, this year they couldn't participate but have said they will look at next year.

**Rotaract** Jo Cook managed our support of the Sandy Bay Rotaract club which has built some greater activity and membership this year. They spoke to our club a couple of times this year and given us support on a few projects, including the Art Show.

**4. FUNDING:**

**Director – Greg Cooper**

The completion of the Hug House fundraiser, enabled the Club to recommit to supporting funding requests from the Community throughout the year. The funding contributions throughout the year were quite significant, with some very large requests being supporting by the Funding Committee and the Board.

This year \$89,880 was donated to 26 causes. We declined 2 requests, mostly non-specific general requests. The last year processed no requests with all efforts of the club focussed on supporting the Clubs major Hug House fundraising project. The year before last a total of \$22k was funded.

There were a number of significant donations including:

- Chatter Matters for \$8,000;
- Tasmanian drought relief to RAW of \$5,000;
- West Moonah Community House Men's Shed of \$30,800 (Primarily a specific extra allocation out of the funds raised in the sale of the Hug House);
- Food Plant Solutions for \$10,000; and
- Bethlehem House for \$10,000

Local vs International support ratio saw an approximate 60% local allocation this year.

The Committee has been well chaired by Renzo D'Orazio who was ably supported by President Noel when Renzo took leave of absence during the past 12 months. The Committee of Brian Gallagher; Tim Short, Alicia Pelham, Greg Cooper, Richard Herr, Tony Steven, Paul Swifte and Michael Driessen provided excellent support and advice on support or otherwise of the various applications throughout the year.

**Independent auditor's report

**Independence**

To the best of my knowledge and belief, there has been no contravention of auditor independence and any applicable code of professional conduct in relation to the audit.

**Limitation of Scope**

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable to establish complete accounting control over cash received from all of its activities. Verification therefore has been limited to the receipt of funds recorded in the Association's financial records.
